# Pastor Sarah's Reflection

A couple weekends ago, our United Methodist Men hosted another successful yard sale. This event, which happens twice a year, is a wonderful opportunity to not only make money for needs and ministries in our congregation and community, but it is also a chance for us to get to meet some of our neighbors!

At this most recent yard sale, along with a few other changes (moving the hot dog stand location, focusing on renting yard sale spaces instead of selling items ourselves) one thing we tried was providing an activity table for children.

In the now three yard sales I've been here at Calvary for, I've noticed some children, though not a flood of them. If my own experience having my girls at the yard sale is any indication, this is likely a wise move on the part of parents who know that children at a yard sale means more stuff coming home! That said, many of the children I did see at the yard sale did happen to come by our activity table to pick up a treat, color on one of the Bible study coloring pages we had, or pick up a little trinket like a bottle of bubbles.

We are located in a community here in Waldorf that lacks a clear downtown or single gathering area. Most of our local residents commute (many long distances and in the early morning hours and late in the evening, no less!). One of the greatest challenges I have perceived since arriving at Calvary is finding meaningful ways to connect with people in our community.

Though I have spent my entire ministry serving DC commuter communities, the realities of this identity is strongest here than anywhere I've served. Indeed, the great familiarity I've encouraged while sharing with people about the idea for our new ID ministry has garnered a great deal of familiarity with Foundry UMC, which is located in DC. Newer residents are as likely to be able to offer a shared knowledge of location or lifestyle in DC as they are the same in Charles County.

At the same time, both our congregation as well as the local area still includes many people who have deep roots in Charles County—people who remember the county before St. Charles was ever the flicker of an idea.

In my father's appointment in southern Baltimore City, where he served as the pastor at Brooklyn United Methodist Church, the community there had experienced a transition very common for urban churches: a community which had changed a great deal over the years and a congregation that often felt like it as just struggling to keep up. That congregation eventually dove headlong into feeding ministries and helping those new to the community, but they struggled to really connect and evolve as a congregation. Like many white churches in changing urban communities, their membership was increasingly made of up of people who moved out of the city but drove in for church.

It has been a long time since we had any significant residential area immediately near our church. Our situation is in many ways quite different than that of Brooklyn UMC in Baltimore was. But we face a similar challenge—that of finding ways to connect not with people who are like us, but with who makes up our community today. Sometimes that starts with making a bit more effort to connect with people at events

we're already doing (like having a children's activity table at the yard sale), expanding our outreach not only in ways to give but also in ways we form relationships (like not just serving at the Friday and Sunday Our Place Waldorf meals but also attending to meet regular guests and volunteers), and finally, continuing to look for more ways to connect with our community.

As we move forward, I want to invite you to consider three next steps for you and our congregation:

- 1. Sign up (as a family, individual or group) to help provide meals on Fridays or Sundays.
- 2. Join me Sunday evenings to interact with folks during the OPW meal. It is my goal to be present for *at least* two Sunday evenings a month.
- 3. Share your ideas for other events or opportunities within the Charles County (and especially Waldorf) area to get to know our neighbors.

I share your commitment to feeding the emotional, spiritual and physical needs of our neighbors. But in order to do that well, we need to spend more time getting to know our neighbors. I challenge you to make at least one new commitment to do so (either from the list above or another idea you have) so that we as a congregation can more fully and authentically be in relationship with the neighbors God has place around us.

My daughter, Erin, moved from Southern Maryland several years ago, but she never lost her taste for those Southern Maryland blue crabs or her favorite Maryland crab soup. So, after many trials and errors and searching restaurant recipes, online, she came up with her own recipe for Southern Maryland Crab Soup - I must say it has become my favorite. (she does have to leave out the lima beans when she makes it for her dad) Hope you enjoy!

## Erin's Southern Maryland Crab Soup

- 2 quarts water
- 2 quarts vegetable broth
- 2 teaspoons (heaping) Better than Bouillon Chicken
- 2 teaspoons (heaping) Better than Bouillon Beef
- 3 tablespoons seafood seasoning // use Wye River, but
- Old Bay would work)
- 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 4 bay leaves
- 1 ½ tablespoon stevia
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper (to taste) 3 cans diced tomatoes
- 1 teaspoon hot sauce (I use Texas Pete)
- 1 ½ cups carrots
- 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups celery
- 1 bag corn (frozen)
- 1 bag lima beans (frozen)
- 1 bag green beans (frozen)
- 1 medium yellow onion (chopped)
- 2 cups red potatoes (cubed)
- 2 pounds lump crabmeat

Bring water and vegetable broth to a boil on stove top.

Add chicken and beef Better than Bouillon, seafood seasoning, Worcestershire sauce, bay leaves, sugar, salt and pepper.

Transfer stock on the stove top to a slow cooker.

Add tomatoes, hot sauce, carrots, celery, corn, lima beans, green beans and onions. Bring to a low boil.

Add potatoes and crabmeat.

Cook in slow cooker on high for 1 hour. Cook at least another 2 hours in the slow cooker on low. (doesn't hurt to cook longer on low in the slow cooker)

Enjoy a taste of Southern Maryland!
